## Where Is Your Faith?

David, the sweet singer of Israel, wrote: "Some trust in chariots, and some in horses: but we will remember the name of the Lord our God" (Psalms 20:7). What is David saying to us? Basically, there are three places where one can place his trust.

First, David said, "Some trust in chariots." This might stand for the inventions of men. While no one knows when the chariot was first invented, it was a basic means of transportation in David's time. It was also one of the more advanced weapons of war. Technology was not very advanced then, but a charging chariot was certainly something to be feared on the battlefield. Today, some put their trust in the newest inventions of men, whether it be stealth bombers, missles, or nuclear weapons.

David also said, "some trust in horses." The horse represented pure power to the ancient Israelites. Horses were a central part of their way of life. They were used for plowing fields, transportation, in war time, and for communication purposes. Any society or individual who had a horse (or horses) was more adept in construction, agriculturally, and militarily. Therefore, people would trust in horses to make them stronger economically and in times of war. However, horses do have limitations. No matter how long a horse runs or how fast it runs, sooner or later, it gets tired and needs to rest. Horses can do much to aid in the work on a farm, but they cannot forgive sins. Horses were a part of many ancient armies, but they could not foretell the future or reveal God's Word.

The third item that David mentions is: "but we will remember the name of the Lord our God." Technology is not the ultimate help, and raw power is not the greatest aid. The greatest assistance in time of need is from the living God. The Lord knows our needs and how to provide assistance when we need it. Not only that, but God is a loving God who created us, redeemed us, and continues to sustain us. No matter what men invent or what they may find in the natural world, these things can never compare to God.



This afternoon, we will have our bimonthly men's business meeting at 3:30 in room 17.


